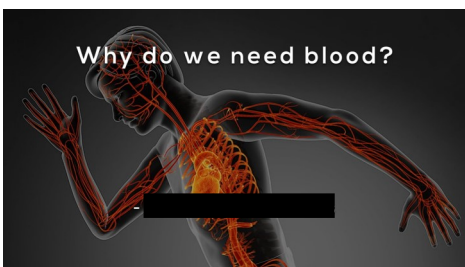
## A VISIT BY THE POLICE
